



WORDS FROM RABBI KIEVAL

Election Day of the Soul

Adapted from Rabbi Kieval's sermon of Rosh Hashanah 2016)

Today is Election Day! No, not that election. I am speaking of our annual Jewish elections: the Days of Awe, when each of us votes for the person we will be in the year to come. In this season, we consider our personal ballot questions: Who am I? Who do I want to be? What matters to me? How do I want the world to be different because I have lived in it? Our task on these days is to take stock of our souls, to do a cheshbon ha-nefesh, an accounting of our inner selves, as we start the new year.

What would we see if we could look inside ourselves? That exercise comes to life in the Pixar film "Inside, Out," as we the viewers see inside an 11-yr-old girl named Riley. Like any pre-teenager, like any of us, Riley is guided and ruled by her emotions. The creative brilliance of the movie is that most of the action takes place inside Riley; her emotions are the main characters of the story. Joy, Fear, Anger, Disgust and Sadness, each represented by a different colored circle, live together inside Riley's head ("Headquarters") and as Riley endures the ups and downs of her days, we view her life from the inside out. We watch her emotions negotiate their roles, such as when Joy tries hard to keep things positive, but sadness and anger take over. Sometimes, the emotions battle each other: sometimes they learn to work as partners, as joy and sadness ultimately do in a powerful way.

Each of us is made up of traits like the ones inside Riley - joy, sadness, anger, as well as so many more, like courage, respect, kindness, trust and pride. How we balance and manage those traits contributes to our unique personality. Imagine if we could see inside and work with our own attributes. Imagine if we could direct the drama of our inner selves? If we could say, in a given moment: Fear - you are preventing me from going forward - it is time for you to step aside; Trust - you must shine strong right now; Anger: this is your moment to act; Joy - it is time for you to muster your

power. Imagine if we could banish some of our impulses, or at least quiet their influence, and build up the strength of others?

One practice that offers a road map for looking inside ourselves is the Jewish one known as *mussar* (instruction). Several of us here at Ohav began a practice of *mussar* together this past year, exploring helpful techniques towards increased self-awareness. If you want to learn more about this practice, please be in touch with me.

The Days of Awe remind us to take time to cultivate our inner lives and to make our own souls more vivid to ourselves. They invite us to observe ourselves, lovingly and honestly. Each of us has strengths; each of us has weaknesses. We can be wonderful: we can be impossible. We can be calm; we can be impatient. We can be gentle and generous; and we can be nasty and selfish. Our composite of traits changes continually based on our experiences, and based on the choices we make. That is where elections come in.



So much happens in our lives that is beyond our control, yet as we gain a deeper under-standing

of our insides, we are better able to make thoughtful, deliberate choices on the outside. To live by design, not by accident. To elect to be a mensch: a decent, ethical human being and Jew.

The High Holy Days are our big Jewish election season, but in truth, we vote all the time. We make decisions: should I say hello to the stranger standing off to the side at the party, or just stick with my friends? How should I react to that slow driver creeping along in front of me when I am late, rushing to morning minyan: with rage, or with patience? Is this a moment to criticize my spouse, my child or my



friend, or is this a moment to tell them how much they mean to me?

We vote in these mini-elections all the time. Mostly we cast our ballots without much thought, not even realizing that we are making choices; but a life of integrity requires us to be more thoughtful about choices. Some of these choices seem trivial; indeed *many* of them *are* – but in the end, what we become, and what our world becomes, is really the sum total of the choices we all make, large and small.

And, our decisions do not affect only others; they also change us! Every time we choose to express a certain quality, that quality is strengthened and energized within us. When you offer a kind hand to a stranger, you help that stranger and in addition - the kindness trait grows stronger inside of you. When my patience overcomes my irritation, my capacity for patience is increased. In addition, if we pay attention to our behavior - we might make a more conscious choice the next time - to do the right thing. That is why our sages said – one positive act leads to another - mitzvah goreret mitzvah. Positive acts build on each

Our task, in this season and beyond, is to look inside, to nourish our souls, and to learn to pay deeper attention to our choices. On the election day of the soul – vote early and vote often. As we start a new year, let us face our ballot questions with honesty and with humility: Who am I? Who do I want to be? What matters to me? How do I want the world to be different because I have lived in it?

Shanah tovah, with wishes for a year in which all of us cultivate qualities which bring goodness, harmony and joy to us and to the world in which we live.

A Brief Note From Rabbi Ornstein

Recently, on a quiet Tuesday in August, I had a once in a lifetime experience. After seventeen years of weekly Talmud study with a close friend, we completed our study of an entire Talmudic tractate,



known as Sanhedrin (judicial proceedings in Jewish law). Torah study in our tradition is not merely an intellectual exercise, it is a commandment. Completing



this tractate has been a part of my religious life for nearly two decades.

As we approached the last few paragraphs of the text, I knew this milestone was approaching. But then,

when it happened, I experienced something very strange, almost paradoxical. On the one hand, we finished quietly and matter-of-fact, as part of a routine skype call; the sky did not open, there was no cannon fire to mark the occasion. We were just two Jewish people weaving Torah learning into the fabric of a busy day. On the other hand, we knew that we had arrived at a very important moment in our lives as

How did we celebrate? We chose a new tractate to learn and set out on our journey to continue weekly Torah study, something I hope we will be doing for the rest of our lives.

Torah, whether it's Talmud, Bible, or any other kind of traditional Jewish learning, is a religious obligation. Torah is also a celebration of our relationship with God, the wisdom of our tradition, and our mission as the Jewish people. It is part of our daily routine and yet it is also utterly transforming.

In these all too turbulent times, Torah speaks a language of wisdom to us, as Jews. Americans.

and human beings, from which we can benefit on a daily basis.

As we enter the new year of 5778, I pray that our nation and our world will be able to heed the Torah's call to us to love our neighbors as ourselves, for we are all created in the image of God.

USCJ Condemns Charlottesville Violence

Congregation Ohav Shalom is a member of the United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism. We

stand with the USCJ in condemning the violence and hate displayed in Charlottesville.

Conservative Movement Official Statement on Violent Demonstrations in Charlottesville, VA

"The Rabbinical Assembly and United Synagogue of Conservative Judaism are shocked and horrified by the violent demonstrations of white supremacists, neo-Nazis and their sympathizers in Charlottesville, Virginia this past Saturday which resulted directly in the deaths of one civilian and two state police officers and in many other serious injuries. We applaud the swift and effective actions of Mayor Mike Signer of Charlottesville and Gov. Terry McAuliffe of Virginia, as well as their appropriate condemnations of the bigotry, antisemitism and hatred that inspired the rally itself. Many leaders have taken the indispensable step of naming the dangerous philosophies and movements that united these demonstrators. These events have been rightly labeled as incidents of domestic terror by both Democrats and Republicans.

We call upon United States officials including President Donald Trump and Attorney General Jeff Sessions to condemn neo-Nazi, white supremacist and alt-right movements by name. The repeated failure to do so by top U.S. officials has fueled their growth and poses an imminent threat to all Americans as Saturday's violent rallies showed. History has demonstrated that where a country's leaders fail to condemn these philosophies, violence and hatred can quickly and exponentially consume the fabric of civil society. Our leaders must act now. Let us continue to pray for and to work for the day when all shall "sit under his/her vine and fig tree and none shall make them afraid."

Congressman Tonko is a fifthterm member of the U.S. House of Representatives. He currently represents New York's 20th Congressional District in the Capital Region, including Ohav. Throughout his career, Paul has given voice to the concerns of those often disenfranchised

including the working class, women and minorities, people of color, seniors and the LGBTQA communities as well as clean air and water and the environment. Rep. Tonko has close ties to our Jewish community, is a strong supporter of Israel, and most recently spoke at the opening of the Maccabi Games.

Building on his work in the New York State
Assembly, where he fought for one of the nation's strongest mental health parity laws, known as Timothy's Law, Congressman Tonko continues to promote mental health parity at the federal level and is the voice of the voiceless in our communities. He is a leader on a range of mental health issues in Congress and serves as a Co-Chair of the Mental Health Caucus and the Addiction, Treatment and Recovery Caucus.

Prior to serving in Congress, Representative Tonko was the President and CEO of the New York State Energy Research and Development Authority (NYSERDA). Before that, he served in the New York State Assembly for 25 years. At the age of 26, Congressman Tonko was the youngest person in the history of Montgomery County to be elected to the County's Board of Supervisors.

It is our goal to have it ready for our congregation for the High Holy Days. We are sure our congregants will agree this will be an appreciated and welcoming entryway to Ohav Shalom.

The Safety and Security committee has had a busy year prioritizing and implementing significant safety enhancements to our *shul*. As of this date, the following improvements have been made:

- + Security film on all exterior glass doors
- + New locks on all nursery school room doors enabling each room to be secured from the main hallway
- + Speaker phones in every nursery school room with capability for building-wide announcements and one button dialing to 911
- + New video cameras covering the perimeter, entryways, the sanctuary and critical areas
- + Additional live video monitor for nursery school director
- + Motion detector system throughout the building and the sanctuary
- + Alarm system on entry doors with central monitoring and notification of the Albany Police Dept. (APD)
- + Enhanced door code entry system with four digit entry codes, assigned individually and by group
- + Remote Panic Button System with automatic notification of APD
- + New signage throughout the building
- + Ongoing communication with APD via our Civilian Education Officer

Members of the committee have attended and continue to attend various seminars, webinars, and also Federation-sponsored events to stay up-to-date on current safety and security concerns.

As stated at the Congregational Meeting earlier this year, it is the committee's ongoing goal to continuously improve our safety and security measures at Ohav while maintaining an aura of spirituality, serenity and, in so far as possible, peace of mind.

The Ohav Shalom Inclusion of Individuals with Disabilities Committee comprises individuals with disabilities, parents of individuals with disabilities, professionals in the field, Board members, the Rabbis and interested congregants. The Committee's accomplishments to date include:

- Securing funding to support transportation to religious services
- A consumer accessibility audit of the building and beginning to implement the recommendations
- Purchasing and prominently placing large print Shabbat Siddurim and Machzorim
- Participating in community-wide disabilities awareness and inclusion programs
- Distributing a survey for the congregation to identify barriers to full participation by individuals with disabilities, and compiling the results
- Beginning a discussion with our leadership about our Ten Commandments of Inclusion

The next program during Jewish Disabilities Awareness Month after Shabbat service is scheduled for February 10, 2018. Watch for details!

The Inclusion Committee will continue to review our survey results and discuss strategies and solutions to meet as many specific needs as possible. The Committee's overall goal is to create an environment so that all may benefit from the multiple facets of spirituality, learning and community at our *shul*.

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Mifgash Celebrates 10-year Anniversary!!!

Yes, it's hard to believe, but eleven years ago a team of dedicated community members began their quest to create one centralized Jewish educational community for high school teens. It included countless meetings regarding the goals, the mission, content, logistics and timeframe. There were many discussions with area synagogues regarding the impact of joining schools and the benefits the teens would have by learning and being together under one roof. These conversations led to the formation of the program we know and love today, *Mifgash* Jewish Community High School Program.

Mifgash is an active learning community for Capital Region Jewish teens in grades 9-12, who meet weekly on Sunday evenings. Together they study, strengthening their knowledge and identity, their connection to the community, and their bond to Israel. Our students choose from a diverse selection of discussion-based, interactive classes, based on their interests. Conversation and participation are key elements to the learning, encouraging students to engage in their studies and to express themselves.

This year, *Mifgash* will celebrate its tenth year of Jewish education! Over the past decade, *Mifgash* has educated over four hundred area teens. We have offered more than 200 courses covering topics such as Holocaust Studies, Modern Israel, Hebrew, Jewish Text, World Jewish History, Arab Israeli Conflict, Art, Theater, Music, Dance, Cooking, Yoga, Krav Maga, Medical Bioethics, Law, Current Events, Politics, Community Service, Philanthropy, Women's Studies, and more, making *Mifgash* truly unique. Additionally, what makes *Mifgash* special, is that we invite, unite and welcome ALL high school students who want to explore and expand their Jewish education.

Mitgash will kick off our year by participating in a Teen Leadership Shabbaton Retreat weekend with other high school teens from Buffalo, Syracuse and Rochester on September 8 - 10. In addition, Mifgash has other events planned including a Sukkot celebration and other social events to celebrate holidays and create community among our teens.
