WORDS FROM RABBI KIEVAL

I Made a Mistake: The Gift of the High Holy Days (adapted from a dvar Torah delivered on Yom Kippur 2017)

"Mistakes were made...but not by me!" We do not like to admit that we made a mistake. We rationalize. We justify. We deny. We blame others.

This tendency of human nature was noted by a man named Philip Lader, former American ambassador to Great Britain. More than 30 years ago, Lader and his wife founded a program called Renaissance Weekends. These are study retreats for people who are, in the words of their website, "thought-leaders and trend-setters, emerging leaders, and passionate change-makers of all ages." Participants come together, by invitation only, to share ideas, learn from experts and to form relationships. The idea is for current and future leaders to brainstorm together about the challenges faced by them and by the world at large.

In the early days of the retreat weekends, Lader observed that the participants found one thing especially difficult: in their discussions, they did not like to admit that they made mistakes. He was concerned about this, believing that leaders, change-makers, of all people, need to be capable of acknowledging when and how they have erred, so that they can work to put things right. In Jewish terms, we would call that an ability to engage in teshuvah.

To address the issue, Lader set aside a session at each weekend where a recognized expert gave a talk entitled: "My Biggest Blooper." Imagine: prominent, highly accomplished leaders were asked to stand up in public and describe something that they should not have done, something they were even ashamed to admit. And they did it! Having a ritualized way to do so enabled even these superstars to share their imperfections.

This, in essence, is what we do on Yom Kippur. This day is the high point in our Days of Awe journey of teshuvah. After six weeks of introspection and consideration of where we may have gone wrong, we create a communal space within which each of us is asked to admit our failings and mistakes. Leaders join together with everyone else in

this practice. We are all equal participants in this ritual which essentially gives us permission to admit our mistakes. The ritual is meant to release us from past patterns and free us to change as we go forward into the future. That is Yom Kippur.

The very first Yom Kippur, however, was not about community confession. According to our tradition, the very first Yom Kippur took place between Moshe and God alone. It was after the sin of the Golden Calf. Moshe begged forgiveness for the people, and after much negotiation and drama, God agreed to forgive, and a precedent for sin and forgiveness was introduced. It was on the tenth of Tishrei that Moshe descended the mountain with the second set of tablets, the visible sign of God's forgiveness. That was the first Yom Kippur. It was, as Rabbi Jonathan Sacks writes, a creative, unscripted process of sin, confession and forgiveness that played out privately between Moshe and God. That spectacular drama between heaven and earth was unique, although it provides a model for our personal work of teshuvah, perhaps a private conversation, even an argument, between each of us and God.

The second Yom Kippur came one year later, a vastly different day. The rituals were conducted by the High Priest, Aaron, as set out in our Yom Kippur Torah reading. Unlike Moshe, Aaron followed a choreographed script, with every detail laid out in advance. Unlike the Yom Kippur of Moshe, Aaron's Yom Kippur was communal and public. In contrast with Moshe's, Aaron's process was marked by a search for spiritual purification, and by confession. The High Priest admitted





mistakes – first his, then those of his household, and finally the mistakes of all the people. Admitting mistakes was transformed into a ritual. It was the Jewish version of My Biggest Blooper, placed in a sacred context.

Today, we no longer have a High Priest to confess on our behalf. In our time, on Yom Kippur, each of us emulates the rituals of the High Priest. We are all responsible, all empowered to confess our mistakes. We seek forgiveness and hope to be changed.

Mistakes were made, and we are here to own up to them! This entire season is a great gift of opportunity. It creates a container in which we are not ashamed to say, "I got it wrong." We support one another through the process, and we are supported by the messages of Yom Kippur: Forgiveness is possible. Change is possible. We are not asked to be perfect. We are free beings – of course we will make mistakes! We might even say that if we made no mistakes, we would hardly be alive.

The gift, of course, is not only for this season. If these days do their work – if we do **our** work – the process helps create an opening for honesty and humility for the rest of the year. It creates a culture in which we have permission, and are not embarrassed, to admit mistakes.

On Yom Kippur and every day, these rituals cleanse us and free us; and they empower us, so that we can feel the release and joy of second chances. How fortunate we are that thousands of years ago our Torah and our ancestors crafted this great tradition, in which every mistake we make is an opportunity to say "I'm sorry" and to try again.

Shalom and I and our family wish all of our community at Ohav Shalom a year of sweetness, good health and peace. Shanah Tovah!





During this service we will also welcome and the rabbis will bless members' children who are aged 2 and under. We hope you will join us for this lovely opportunity.







Assuring Ohav's Future – Our Life and Legacy Society Gathers Momentum








