WORDS FROM RABBI ORNSTEIN

Rabbi Ornstein delivered this sermon for Torah portion Va-Yehi, 5778

"Happy families are all alike; every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way."

This famous sentence commences Leo Tolstoy's masterpiece, Anna Karenina, published by the Russian novelist in 1877 and considered by many to be his greatest book. As I have experienced before in reading 19th century Russian novels, I got so lost in the excruciating detail and multiple nicknames of the characters that I gave up reading Anna Karenina about half way through. However, Tolstoy's first line has stayed with me, as a mini-masterpiece of insight -howbeit a cynical one - about the human condition:

"Happy families are all alike; every unhappy family is unhappy in its own way."

Tolstoy might be saying that happy families are so conventional, there is not anything too interesting to say about them. Great stories come from the unhappy families, the varieties of whose miserable dysfunctions are the perverse spice of life and literature. The Torah's cycle of Joseph stories that we have been reading the last few weeks substantiates Tolstoy's insight, without saying it as explicitly or cynically as he did. The Torah never tells us that Jacob's favoritism destroyed his children's lives, that his family was a mess, that the siblings were vicious to each other, or that this family could have used serious psychotherapy. With deceptively simple, beautiful, often brutal language, the Torah simply tells us the often-unhappy story of Joseph and his brothers, leaving us to contemplate how this great biblical family was unhappy in its own way. Setting sentimental platitudes about family life aside, the Torah teaches, howbeit indirectly, that family members can be quite cruel to each other: blood is not always thicker than water, and at times, bloodshed is more the reality for some families than blood ties. As the philosopher, Leon Kass, remarks in his commentary on the Cain and Abel story, Genesis comes to teach us that, outside a framework of

covenant and social contract, "there are no natural impulses or passions that seek to unite brother with brother." Making the leap from shared genetic material to shared emotions of love and loyalty is not necessarily a given in families.

It is precisely on this point that the Torah distinguishes itself as a fine moral guide for family life and relationships, one that offers families hope and vision. All of Genesis, from Cain and Abel through the stories of Joseph and his brothers, shows us how jealousy, favoritism, sibling strife and divide-and-conquer parenting strategies can easily wreck families. However. Genesis also shows us how the hard but hopeful work of forgiveness and repentance, responsibility and reconciliation gives us the opportunity to find our way through the worst of the wreckage. The Joseph stories, in particular, demonstrate this without whitewashing the very real suffering that families often endure and that estranges family members. Recall

that, in his position as second in command over Egypt, Joseph only reveals himself gradually to his brothers after twenty years of deep estrangement. Though the test that he puts them through can be read as his attempt to exact revenge, the more likely interpretation is that Joseph is testing to see if his brothers have grown. Faced with a situation similar to when they sold him into slavery then passed him off as dead, would they take responsibility for their youngest, least favorite brother, Benjamin, or would they not? Note that there is no indication in the story cycle as to whether older brother, Judah, loves Benjamin. That is, in some respects, irrelevant. What matters is whether Judah would stand up for



his brother in a time of crisis, regardless of how he felt about him: something that Judah as the ring leader had not done for Joseph decades before.

The capacity of people to salvage family - - if not necessarily good family feelings and love - - from the wreckage of unhappy family dysfunction is encapsulated in two short Torah verses. After twenty years of not seeing his father, Joseph takes his two sons to meet their aging grandfather for the first time:

Now Israel's eyes were dim with age; he could not see. So Joseph brought them close to him, and he kissed them and embraced them. And Israel said to Joseph, "I never expected to see you again, and here God has let me see your children as well." (Genesis 48:10-11.)


In two short verses, words related to seeing occur four times. Such frequent repetition alerts us to the importance of the idea of seeing at this point in our story. Jacob/Israel is too old to see well anymore. However, he recognizes what real seeing, real vision, is all about. He never expected to ever see his son again, for he assumed that he was dead; yet God saw him through all his family's suffering and repentance, so that he could experience what he never thought could be true: being able to see not only his son but his grandsons. His heartbreaking comment is an astute insight about what the true nature of healthy families often is: working very hard to see beyond differences and hurts - some quite profound - so that we cultivate a vision of what our family can turn out to be.


Summer Camp

THE KOSHER 💣 **CHOPPER** NEEDS OUR INPUT AND SUPPORT

On May 11, 2018, the Vaad Hakashruth Board of Directors sent out a letter regarding a meeting with the store manager and members of the Kosher Department at Price Chopper. Excerpts from that letter follow below.

"The meeting was held to discuss several important issues including: 1) Last Passover review 2) Next Passover - products and service 3) The need to support the kosher store or face losing the store 4) Ways to raise the store's image in the Jewish community 5) Ways to market the kosher products and raise community awareness of the availability of prepared foods 6) Possibility of synagogues holding kosher nights 7) Creating coops in the synagogues, where bulk orders are placed and delivered to the synagogues for members convenience in picking up 8) Marketing pre-packaged and sealed kosher meat sandwiches to be sold and delivered to other neighborhood stores 9) Possible summer barbecues at the kosher store 10) Exploration of how to help families and seniors with food deliveries."

"...We believe there is a commitment to the Jewish community to serve "kosher needs" but without community support that commitment is unsustainable. The store manager asked that the community reach out with comments and suggestions by emailing kosher224@pricechopper.com.... With the active support of our community we can ask for more and better service. Without that active support we cannot expect kosher to be important to Price Chopper."

Tisha B'Av Observance

Tisha B'Av, the 9th day of the Hebrew month of Av, is the day on which the first and second temples in Jerusalem were destroyed, followed by persecution and exile for the Jewish people. According to tradition, it is the day on which the expulsion of the Jews from Spain occurred in 1492. Tisha B'Av is a day of communal fasting, mourning, and remembering. It is also when, according to tradition, the messiah will be born, thus commencing our people's and the world's redemption from evil.

This year, *Tisha B'av* services will be held at the following times at Ohav:

Saturday Evening, July 21

7:15 pm: Shabbat afternoon service followed by third meal for Shabbat. (Tisha B'Av fast begins at 8:27 pm)

9:17 pm: Evening service followed by reading from the book of Lamentations.

In keeping with the spirit of Tisha B'Av, please consider wearing non-leather shoes during the service and reading of Lamentations. Please also consider bringing a flashlight, as we will be dimming the lights in keeping with the somber spirit of the evening.

Sunday, July 22

8:30 am: Tisha B'Av morning services. We do NOT wear Tallit and Tefillin that morning.

7:30 pm: Tisha B'Av afternoon services. We DO wear Tallit and Tefillin that afternoon. (Fast ends at 8:59 pm)



I have spent many years in the rabbinate helping people through the traumas of failed marriages, broken friendships, and estrangements in which family members become distant or cut each other off. I have hopefully developed more humility by learning not to judge anyone quickly. At times, each family is truly unhappy in its own way; the decisions people make to remove themselves from the reach of certain relationships can be no less than pikuach nefesh, an act of saving life, one's own and those of others.

Yet, I have also learned that at other times, family members make decisions about relationships with extremely limited vision. A hurt or conflict that should have been allowed to heal is nursed with miscommunication and anger, then inflamed and stoked into family ruin. Rather than look carefully at what the hurt is about then developing a more helpful, hopeful vision of what could be, family members stay stuck where they are; they see only what they want to see or think they must see. They become to each other what Bruce Springsteen tragically called prisoners of love in chains.

The family stories of Genesis are, first and foremost, just that: stories meant to convey more than to convince. They recognize with great humility and compassion just how complicated family life can be, how unhappy in its own way a family can sometimes be. Yet these stories offer us something more than the sight of unhappiness. They offer us the chance to see things differently, to work hard for a different vision for families, one of love, reconciliation, forgiveness and redemption.



High Holy Day Honors Explained

The High Holy Days are just around the corner. Rosh Hashanah starts at sundown on Sunday, September 9. Full day services are on Monday, September 10 and Tuesday, September 11.

Kol Nidre begins on Tuesday evening, September 18, with full day Yom Kippur services on Wednesday, September 19.


The High Holy Day Committee has been working tirelessly to ensure that our services are inspiring, meaningful and well-run. To accomplish all this, the Committee reaches out to and schedules congregants to lead various parts of the services, organizes floor *parnasim* coverage for all four days and distributes High Holy Day honors.

Several years ago, the Board of Trustees created an honors policy that calls for one third of the honors going to members of the Board of Trustees and Ohav Officers, one third to new members and one third to other congregants. In order to receive an honor, a member MUST be in good financial standing with the Synagogue. This means all obligations, including dues, *B'Yachad* (Hebrew school), Nursery School, etc., through May 31, 2018 (end of our 2017-18 fiscal year) must be paid in full and payments for the 2019 fiscal year must have been started.

Those given honors receive a letter with all pertinent information such as which honor on what day, approximate time and appropriate dress for going up on the *Bimah*. With about a thousand people at services, it is difficult for everything to run smoothly or on time, so we ask for your understanding about this as well as the fact that the *parnasim* on the floor may not know who you are. That's why it is so important for you to let us know that you've arrived and approximately where you'll be seated.

Our goal is to make the High Holy Days an enjoyable and spiritual experience for all of us. It you have any questions about the committee or about what we do, please e-mail Laurie Abelson at laurie33154@gmail.com. Thank you.

Through the collaborative efforts of the Inclusion Committee (THANKS to Judy Avner and Sharon Lozman for great shopping prowess and making things happen!), Sheryl Welton, and Nancy Pandolfo, Ohav Shalom now has a Comfort Room. The Comfort Room is a therapeutic environment intended to assist people

experiencing sensory overstimulation in their self-calming efforts, by affording them an environment conducive to relaxation. The Comfort Room is located near the administrative offices in the school wing and may be accessed by key. During Shabbat morning services, the parnas on



the floor and the rabbis have access to the keys. The office will apprise appropriate individuals how to access the keys to the Comfort Room during other events such as a bar/bat mitzvah, etc.

Note: The Comfort Room should NOT be used as punishment or reward. Children in need of the room must be accompanied by a parent. Once calm, individuals previously over-stimulated by sensory input may return to the activity.

Thanks go to Sheryl Welton, Nursery School Director for her willingness to share this nursery school space with the Inclusion Committee. The room is collaboratively used as a breastfeeding space, and special education pullout space for students needing extra help.

Also, *mazal tov* to Melanie Hecker, co-chairperson of the Inclusion Committee. Melanie, a student at the University at Albany, was interviewed by a reporter for the Albany Student Press, the university's newspaper. Rabbi Rena signed a contract in 2018 ensuring she will be with us for the next four years!

Rabbi Rena has served for many years as a spiritual, educational and pastoral leader at Congregation Ohav Shalom and in the wider Albany community. She was ordained in 2006 by the Academy for



Jewish Religion in New York. Prior to her tenure at Ohav Shalom, Rabbi Kieval served for seven years as the staff Jewish chaplain at Albany Medical Center, where she received formal chaplaincy training. In her earlier professional life, Rabbi Kieval earned a Masters degree in Social Work from Boston University and worked in the field of mental health. She later served as Jewish Family Educator at Hebrew Academy of the Capital District, implementing programs there, at Ohav Shalom and at other area synagogues. She was especially involved in creating innovative worship services for adults and children and in founding Ohav's hevra kadisha, the traditional sacred burial society.

Rabbi Dan renewed his contract with Ohav in 2016, and has been with Congregation Ohav Shalom for nearly 23 years. He is proud to call Ohav his synagogue. He currently serves as the



We celebrate our extraordinary rabbinical team, and wish them continued success and mazal!










Here are some of the highlights from the end of the school year: Seder Workshop

Parents had the opportunity to see different *Haggadot*, brainstorm different ways of enhancing their seders and incorporate some relevant readings into their seders.






