Your cooperation is necessary to successfully implement many of these steps.

But this isn't only about security - it is about responding to threats with our better selves and living our values. Welcoming the Stranger, a *mitzvah* repeated many times in the Torah, remains a focus of our congregation as we continue to support refugee families in our community. Our social action groups continue to assist the Regional Food Bank and the Interfaith Partnership for the Homeless. Through Yad Yonatan and our *Chevra Kadisha* we continue to care for our families through illness and loss. The list can go on, and there is a place for each of you. Look through the pages of this DASH and decide to become involved in one of the activities.

We come to Ohav to soothe our souls, to be in our community. At Ohav, together with our rabbis and fellow congregants, we see how we can best respond to the forces around us with hope and commitment to our values. I wish you many points of light this winter, many candles in the dark that you will light for yourselves, your families and those around you. May 2019 be a good and peaceful year.

WORDS FROM RABBI DAN ORNSTEIN

You Be The Wake-up Call!

Rabbi Ornstein's sermon on the first day of Rosh Hashanah, 5779.

In a world of endless sound, noise, cacophony and meaningless chatter, some sounds stand out, silencing every other sound around them.

Listen to the shofar's sound: Tekiah! An anxiety-provoking alarm whose job is not to soothe or quiet you into complacency but to be your wake-up call, agitating you sharply tuned - into action.

Listen again:

Tekiah! A sound exploding out of a thin piece of hollowed ram's horn, like hot lava out of a volcano. The sound is so primitive, so elemental, so deep from the heart, it is no wonder that the master composer and conductor, Leonard Bernstein, used it as the opening melodic line of his tragic musical masterpiece, "West Side Story." Though not ritually observant, Bernstein, the son of Orthodox Jewish immigrants, was so suffused with love for Jewish symbols, so saturated with the musical sounds and values of Judaism, that he made tekiah the sound ominously warning the viewer to wake up: to watch carefully the star-crossed lover's story of Tony and Maria unfolding in the asphyxiating web of racial hatred and violence.

Tekiah: the wake-up call. The Bible mentions the blasting of the shofar seventy-one times, each mention a wake-up call to something: the threat of war, the mustering of military troops, the approach of a king, the advent of a celebration, or the terrifying revelation of God. Writing thousands of years after the Torah, the great Jewish scholar, Maimonides, teased out this idea of the shofar blasts providing us with an uncomfortable, badly needed wakeup call: "It is as if [the shofar's call] is saying: 'Wake up you sleepers from your sleep and you who slumber, arise. Inspect your deeds, repent, remember your Creator... Improve your ways and your deeds and let every one of you abandon his evil path and thoughts." Maimonides delivered an intriguing sermon to us in this passage. In an earlier passage, he admitted that the main reason we blow the shofar on Rosh

Hashanah is because the Torah commands us to do so. Yet Maimonides was never one to miss an opportunity to show us how each commandment of the Torah has a distinctly rational and practical appeal. You and I all know how annoying and frustrating it is for us to be sound asleep only to be rudely awakened by a 6 am alarm clock; to the point where, if we were a little less well-behaved, we would smash the alarm clock against the bedroom wall. Yet without that alarm, we would sleep through the day and its responsibilities awaiting us. Maimonides' alarm clock is our wake -up call: "Tekiah! Wake up, inspect your behavior, review your values... det a real life!"

I appreciate Maimonides' explanation of the shofar as a wakeup call to us. Yet the earlier rabbis and the later Jewish mystics offered an entirely different explanation; for them, the shofar is not God's wake up call to us, it is our wake-up call to God. Like Dr. Seuss' "Whos of Whoville" in his parable, "Horton Hears A Who," we are so tiny in the endless expanse of the universe that seems basically deaf to our presence. Still, we come together as one combative collective voice, making these ominous battle noises with our battle horns to force God, as it were, to acknowledge that, "We are here, we are here, we are here."

All of these explanations about the shofar and wake-up calls are creative and insightful, but, as far as I am concerned, they all miss the most important symbolic dimension of the shofar. We blast Tekiah, Shevarim Teruah on the shofar this diminutive ram's horn with a huge voice - but the ram's horn is not the real shofar; the ram's horn is





a mere symbolic stand-in for the real wake-up call, and that wake-up call is us. You and I need wake-up calls, it is true, but even more true is that you and I need to be wake-up calls. We are the shofar. Let me explain what I mean. Let's consider the biblical story of Joshua and the walls of Jericho. Joshua, you will recall, was Moses' successor to leadership; he brought our ancestors into the promised land and set about conquering it for Israelite settlement. To conquer the Canaanite city of Jericho, the first of many walled, well enforced fortress cities. Joshua commanded the people to march around Jericho once a day, each day, for six days, making not a sound, as the priests blasted ominous notes of war on their shofars. On the seventh day, after the people marched around the city seven times. Joshua commanded them, "Shout! For The Lord has given you the city." The Bible then tells us what happened next: "So the people shouted when the shofars were sounded. When the people heard the sound of the shofars, the people raised a mighty shout and the wall [of Jericho] collapsed." On first hearing this, you might think that this verse is just repeating itself meaninglessly, but I think that something profound is being conveyed here. The Bible is purposely blurring the lines of distinction between the sounds of the shofar and the sounds of the people shouting, so that the reader or the listener can no longer tell the difference between the two. God's miracle of the collapse of Jericho's wall happens because the people, with one great shouting voice, become the shofar blast. The shofars are no longer the wake-up call: the people are.

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Many Voices: Ta Sh'ma (Come and Hear)

Judaism evolves and remains strong through its honoring of different perspectives, and through our core value of respect for all people regardless of differences.


This class, which started on 11/8, is studying classic Jewish texts that explore the foundations of Jewish pluralism. Knowledge of

Hebrew and previous text experience are not required.





We at Ohav Shalom continue to mourn the loss of our brothers and sisters in Pittsburgh, and we are mindful of changes in our society that sadly make the safety and security of our congregants an even more crucial aspect of our synagogue lives. With antisemitism on the rise, and mass shootings occurring in the United States more often, we have considered the implication on the safety and security of our shul.

We want to assure you that the leadership of Ohav Shalom is always mindful of the need to strike a balance between maintaining the sanctity of our shul and the need for safety and security. We continue to work with law enforcement to determine that best course of action for our shul.

We are developing short -term and long-term options. The need for police presence will be evaluated on an ongoing basis. That said, we need your understanding and cooperation to make our safety and security steps effective.

- OUTSIDE DOORS The doors to the building will be locked based upon the recommendation that we limit access to our building. A code will be required for entry. We know this may pose an issue for some individuals coming to morning Minyan to say kaddish or observe a vahrtzeit. If you know in advance that you will be needing access, please call the office for a code.
- ACCESS CODES for entry into the building have been changed. If you had been using a code for access and have not received a new code. please call the office as soon as possible. PLEASE DO NOT GIVE YOUR CODE TO ANYONE ELSE. Please ask anyone else needing a code to contact the office directly.
- GREETERS We have been advised by law enforcement that having greeters should be a priority. We have implemented a Shabbat Greeters program for the front door on Shabbat. This will include greeter training. We cannot implement this step without YOUR involvement. Please consider signing up to be a Greeter on

Shabbat morning. You are able to sign up to be a Greeter at https://www.signupgenius.com/ go/8050845a9ad2ea75-ohav.

- **NO TAILGATING PERMITTED** Please do NOT prop open any door or let in people you do not know.
- **SINGLE ACCESS POINT We** have been advised to follow the practice of limiting access to our building by using a single point of entry and exit. Please use the administrative entrance (the middle glass doors) during the week for entry and exit. We know this may be inconvenient, but we have been advised that this is essential.
- **TRAINING** Please look for notice of education and training programs that we will be offering to the congregation around safety and security.
- MUM'S THE WORD We also have been advised not to publicize the details of every security measure we implement. So, if you're in the know, please keep your knowledge to yourself.
- **PLEASE OBEY THE RULES** Please do not use your judgement as to when and whether or not to bend these rules. There can be no exceptions to them. When you substitute your judgment for that of experienced law enforcement. you risk the safety of everyone in the building.

Over the next few months we hope to implement a host of additional security measures to the physical structure and to our procedures. We regret that we find ourselves in this position, but we feel they are necessary to maintain a safe space in which we all can come together to worship, learn and gather.

- · Participating in the World Wide Wrap



Welcoming the Stranger

More than 20 members of Ohav are volunteering in efforts to aid refugees and immigrants in Albany. We have members who are giving hours of their time each month to help two large refugee families from rural Afghanistan acclimate to life in the U.S. Ohav members also volunteer at USCRI, one of our local immigrant aid organizations. And, another group is preparing to teach a computer literacy class at the new Refugee Welcome Center.

Our shul's assistance has yielded some significant accomplishments. All the members of both Afghan families have obtained Green Cards, enabling them to work and lead productive lives in the U.S. This was made possible through the help of congregants and others who drove the family to immigration and fingerprinting appointments, as well as the generous support of our Rabbis Discretionary Funds. In addition, our B'Yachad 8th graders raised money to send five of the children to day camp for a week this past summer - an experience that is the highlight of their year.

Overall, the families are doing well, benefiting from regular health and dental care, and making progress in school. We are particularly pleased that our eldest high school student has passed four Regents exams after less than three years in this country.

Our volunteers are still working hard to help the families navigate our often confusing education, employment, banking, and health care systems. They also try to provide some recreational outlets and tutoring when time permits.

We could use your help. We need people to schedule and/or drive families to medical appointments, even once a month. The families also need English and Algebra tutors.

Tax-Wise Year-End Giving

According to the experts, the charitable giving at the year's end remains a good option for donors. We hope you will consider donating to Ohav Shalom as you consider your year-end giving options this month.

Here's some information to assist you in making these important decisions.

New for 2018

The threshold determination every donor must make is whether it will be possible to itemize deductions this year. Fortunately, the tax deductions associated with charitable gifts were preserved and, at least in one respect, enhanced: contributions of cash can now be deducted up to a limit of 60 percent of adjusted gross income. Nevertheless, charitable deductions - either on their own or combined with other itemized deductions - must exceed the standard deduction to produce any benefit.

Options That Remain Appealing

Long-term appreciated capital assets continue to be a great choice for use in charitable giving. When they are transferred directly instead of being sold, they are deductible at their full value and completely avoid capital gains tax. Also, if you are over age 70 1/2 and have a traditional IRA, the law allows you to transfer up to \$100,000 a year directly from the IRA to an organization such as Ohav Shalom without any increase to taxable income. Your gift is not tax deductible but can be used to satisfy your required minimum distribution, if you haven't already taken it for the year.

Next Steps

Once you have an idea of how you might like to proceed, be sure to consult your professional advisors. In addition, Ohav Shalom representatives can work with you and your advisors to help identify effective ways to have the charitable impact you desire in 2018 and beyond. Now admittedly, in context, the story of "Joshua fought the battle of Jericho and the walls came tumbling down" is not a nice story. It is about bloody conquest, one in which our ancestors— like many conquerors of the ancient world – put the entire city to the sword, every man, woman, child, and animal, at God's command no less. This is one of those sacred texts in our great biblical tradition that make us awfully uncomfortable. But we do not merely read these texts of our Bible in their original contexts. We extract new messages and meanings from them that transcend their original meanings. I ask you to consider the following interpretation of the Jericho story, one which that old gospel hymn sung by African American slaves anticipated almost two hundred years ago. The walls of Jericho are a symbol. Certainly, there are walls that are absolutely necessary: boundaries of individual and collective identity are critical, and at times physical boundaries of security are the only thing standing between a community and those seeking to destroy it. Yet too many walls unnecessarily shut us in and there are far too many walls that unjustly shut others out. Perhaps it would take no less than a miracle from God to make those walls tumble down: but that miracle does not happen, God cannot make it happen, without the collective power, the collective outrage, the collective shout, the collective voice, the collective wake-up call that is you and me, together...us. We are the shofar, we are the wake-up call, we must be the alarm that pierces the walls of apathy, of despair, of increasing insularity and fear and hostile disdain.

This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the walls of polarization and extremism that threaten to stamp out civil debate and disagreement, withering our precious fragile democracy through intimidation, mob rule and the many languages of hatred coursing right now like poison through the bloodstream of America.

This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the literal and political walls being built by people in power who would seek to turn away altogether the tired and the poor, the huddled masses who never stop

yearning to be free. Let's be the wall-shattering *shofar* blast calling out those who think they can forcibly separate parents from their children with impunity, and let's remind those who are happy to forget, that we have always been, always are, and always will be a proud nation of immigrants.

This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the walls of the climate change deniers, to demand of them that they renounce their willful ignorance of science, their pseudo-theories, their government conspiracy narratives, their cynical corporate selfishness and complacency about the failing health of our one and only planetary home.

This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock

down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the walls of those at home and around the globe, who deny Israel's right to exist and thrive as the Jewish state. Let's make them understand that having our own sovereign, secure homeland is not an option, it is not a dalliance, it is not an exercise in bigotry: it is the Jewish people's absolute right and the world's absolute obligation. Let's knock down the walls of antisemitism posing as social justice of those who seek to shame us and our young people for being proud Zionists, for loving the miracle that is the State of Israel.


This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the walls of rigid ideologues and demagogues who are dividing the Jewish people by trying to force us and our Israeli brothers and sisters into making the false choice between Israel as a

democratic state and Israel as a Jewish state; who maliciously insinuate that if you believe Israel's occupation of the Palestinians must end, for their sake and for ours, then you must hate Israel; who insidiously imply that if you oppose the perverted stranglehold of the Israeli rabbinate and fundamentalist politicians on Israeli and world Jewish society, then you must be a self-hating Jew. I know all too well that Israel faces dilemmas and dangers we Americans cannot begin to understand. Precisely because I am a Zionist who loves the Jewish people and the Jewish state, I must wake up the world to when the Jewish state is in danger from its external enemies. But precisely because I am a Zionist, I must also wake up my fellow Jews to when we are putting ourselves in danger of eroding our people's unity, democratic values and commitments to civil rights.

This coming year, I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's knock down the thick and forbidding walls separating America's wealthiest and America's poorest, being made thicker by the small-minded selfishness and lust for power of entitled government elites and corporate oligarchies. Let's knock down the walls of institutionalized racism and bigotry that some very powerful people exploit to keep too many Americans locked inside their fears of the other, and to keep far too many more Americans locked out of all that America can and should offer them and all our citizens.

This coming year I want to be a wake-up call, I want to knock down walls, and I ask you to join me: let's blast out a siren's endless wail of emergency and resistance against the apathy and hopelessness too many Americans, too many Jews, too many human beings are experiencing. As good Jews, Americans, and human beings, let's raise our voices, cast our ballots, protest the injustices, peacefully and forcefully take to the streets, fight the battles against bigotry and despair and ignorance.

We will be the wake-up calls Judaism calls upon us to be, so that the walls separating us from each other will come tumbling down. **x**

Celebrating Tu B'Shevat

Tu B'Shevat - the Jewish New Year for the Trees - begins on the evening of January 20, 2019 and continues through the day on January 21. Although based on a biblical tradition, and observed after the destruction of the Temple, the character of Tu B'Shevat took shape under the guidance of the medieval *kabbalists* (mystics). Over time it has developed into a popular Jewish "arbor day" with spiritual overtones. Originally associated with planting crops and trees in ancient times, this day has become associated with planting trees and holding symbolic ritual meals characterized by eating fruits and nuts from the land of Israel.



Purim begins at sundown on Wednesday, March 20, and ends at sundown on Thursday, March 21.

The story of the joyous holiday of Purim might appear somber at first because it tells of the near-destruction of the Jewish people as decreed by Haman, an adviser to the Persian King Ahasuerus. However, Ahasuerus' newly crowned queen, Esther, who is secretly Jewish, saves the day. Hence, the story of Purim is known as "Megillat Esther," or the Scroll of Esther.

There are several common practices on Purim: We: give gifts to poor people; read the megillah, the Purim story; eat a festive meal, or *seudah*; give food gifts, called *mishloah manot*, to our friends; eat *hamantaschen*, triangle-shaped cookies named for the villainous Haman.

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
