Ohav's online presence has a new look in a new home, thanks to the efforts of Debbie Rausch, Judy Avner, and Nancy Pandolfo. The new site, www.ohavshalom.org, is a complete overhaul of the content, functionality and presentation of Ohav's dynamic programs and services.

With a fresh look and feel, the new site affords users the opportunity to navigate with ease through Ohav Shalom's extensive programs and services. Users longer need to hunt around for information. Instead, pulldown menus provide simple navigation, or users can use the search menu to find what they're looking for. Delivering a fully responsive experience, the new website gives users a seamless transition from desktop to mobile browsing.

The new site enables users to do many things online that were previously not possible. For example, you can now make donations, check out and sign up for upcoming events, complete membership forms, learn about and plan lifecycle events, get your children involved religious education or events and so much more.

Working with Hirsch Fishman, who grew up at Ohav and is now Owner and Web Designer of Addicott Web, has yielded us a good-looking and easy-to-use website. While most of the website's functionality is complete, the Members Only and Gift Shop are still under construction. The Members Only section is ready for members to login, but is not complete. Eventually members will be able to view and pay their dues online. The Gift Shop will enable users to order items online for delivery to addresses within the United States or pick-up in the Ohav Shalom office.

WORDS FROM RABBI RENA KIEVAL

Who Knows Four? Celebrating Our Season of Freedom

We are approaching Passover, the "Season of our Freedom" (z'man heiruteinu) as the holiday is referred to in rabbinic literature. Freedom is a primary focus of our Jewish foundational story, the Exodus.

Freedom and its many manifestations are also, of course, at the core of American democracy. When we think about freedom, we might recall the words of President Franklin Roosevelt, when in 1943 he famously declared that all Americans and all people are entitled to Four Freedoms: the freedom of speech and expression, the freedom to worship God in one's own way, freedom from want and freedom from fear. His dramatic words to our nation as it prepared to enter World War II were immortalized by Norman Rockwell's beautiful paintings depicting these Four Freedoms.

cleaning," cleansing ourselves of excess material "stuff," of arrogance, described by some sages as our 'puffed-up' chametz qualities, or of old behavior patterns we need to shed. Passover is a spring holiday, chag ha-aviv, when life is renewed, starting over. As free people, we might take opportunities for our own second chances. Or, we might offer a second chance to others through our support or by mending a relationship. We celebrate our freedom to start anew, just as the liberation from Egypt was a new start for the children of Israel.

TWO: FREEDOM INCLUDES ALL PEOPLE

Before we start our *seder*, before we celebrate and enjoy our bounty, we symbolically "open the

door" and say "Let all who are hungry come and eat." Judaism teaches that liberation is not complete if all are not free. As we celebrate our own story of freedom, we make a commitment to reach out to those who are not free.

We are truly free when we can look beyond

ourselves to the needs of others. As we break the middle *matzah*, we remember our broken selves throughout Jewish history, and those among us who are still not whole. We open our homes to guests, we give *tzedakah* and recall the mandate of the Exodus to work harder to bring freedom to all people.

THREE: FREEDOM OF THOUGHT, AN OPEN MIND

Questions are an integral part of the *seder*, and the ability to question is the quintessential expression of freedom. Only those who are free can challenge the status quo and ask hard questions. Jewish thought and law have developed through questioning and Judaism has always encouraged and nurtured intellectual openness.

One passage in the *Haggadah* that especially lends itself to an exploration of this theme is that of the Four Children. These four



characters, based on verses in the Torah, are perhaps included in the *Haggadah* precisely to encourage challenging questions. As we meet them at the *seder*, we might consider what these questioners represent: different approaches to religion, different learning styles, different personalities, different aspects of ourselves. How should we best engage with these diverse characters when we encounter them in our own lives?

FOUR: FREEDOM FROM WANTING MORE; DAYENU!

The most beloved song of the seder, Dayenu, literally means "it would have been enough." This song highlights what it means to be truly grateful for all of our gifts, even if objectively they may not be really sufficient, "enough."

A free person is one who is not imprisoned by a perpetual desire for more; a truly free person is able to appreciate their portion, celebrate it and sing *dayenu* – it is enough!

This year, let us deepen our understanding of and commitment to freedom in its many profound manifestations. Our sages teach that on *Pesach*, we do not merely *think* about freedom; rather each of us should truly *feel* what it means to be free.

To accomplish this, at the *seder* we should not feel bound only to the traditional text of the *Haggadah*. "Anyone who expands on the story of the Exodus is to be praised," they said.

At our gatherings this year, let us explore, be creative and have fun, and may each of us find ways to truly experience the great gift of freedom.

With best wishes from me and from my family to you and yours for a joyous and meaningful Passover! **



At our Jewish celebration of freedom, the Passover *seder*, the magic number is also four. We recall four verbs from the Torah's Exodus story which mark our people's journey from slavery to rescue to liberation to redemption, and we drink four cups of wine. We sing four questions and discuss the four children, as we share the evocative tastes, symbols, songs and stories of the *Haggadah* and our story of liberation.

On Passover, freedom is not only the focus of the Exodus story; it is also the theme built into the customs and rituals we observe. As we celebrate this holiday, as we sit at our *seder* tables this year, we might use these rituals to examine how we, individually and collectively, could incorporate the following "Four Freedoms" of Passover into our world and into our lives.

ONE: THE FREEDOM TO START OVER

Cleaning out our *chametz* can be both a physical and spiritual "spring





Victor Asal, PhD. Presented at Shabbat Services, Saturday, March 23

Dr. Victor Asal discussed issues surrounding democracy in Israel immediately following Shabbat services on Saturday, March 23, 2019. His presentation ended with a question/answer session and group discussion.

"It was a pleasure to welcome back Dr. Asal," said Rabbi Rena Kieval. "We live in a time of constant change and uncertainty on the global stage - and Dr. Asal's expertise and field of knowledge offered the insight and reassurance we're all seeking."

Asal is a political science professor at the University at Albany's Rockefeller College, as well as chair of the public administration department. His coursework is focused on world and comparative politics, political violence and oppression, negotiation and research design. Asal's research centers, in part, on state supported political discrimination against sexual minorities, women and ethnic groups, as well as the impact of nuclear proliferation. His has worked with the Department of Homeland Security and National Science Foundation, and has served as a negotiation trainer in a variety of academic, governmental and military settings.

"As American Jews, Israel is never far from our hearts," says Rabbi Dan Ornstein." We are very lucky to have someone of Dr. Asal's stature keep us updated on the status of democracy in that part of the world.

Many Voices: Ta Sh'ma (Come and Hear)




This class, which started on 11/8, is studying classic Jewish texts that explore the foundations of Jewish pluralism. No knowledge of Hebrew or previous text experience required.

Project Atid, Continued from Front Page

The purpose of Project *Atid* is to assess the current status of Ohav Shalom, identify our strengths and challenges, and consider what the next 5-10 years might look like as we plan for our future both as a Conservative congregation and as a vital part of the Capital District Jewish and larger communities. We are building on the congregation's most recent strategic plan, Project *Lech Lecha*, which was completed in 2010. After reviewing that report, we are pleased to share that Ohav has already implemented a great many of the report's recommendations and has exceeded the membership numbers predicted for this fiscal year.

The subcommittees are currently working to assess a number of areas including: demographics, finances, membership (inclusivity per the new USCJ definition, attracting new members, retention), Judaic religious practice, education/ lifelong learning, physical plant, relationship with USCJ, relationship with the Ohav apartments, and potential community collaborations and partnerships within our Jewish community. Updates will be provided over the next few months along with opportunities for the congregation to be involved. This is for and about all of us. **

For safety reasons, we have put caution tape around the entire playground site.



Mifgash caters to their needs and offers them a wide variety of classes from *Tikkun Olam*, Community Service at the Ohav Apartments, learning about *Jews in the News*, taking a *Jewish Culinary Journey* in the dairy kitchen, learning about *Political Advocacy* with a Jewish view, studying about *Ethics and Values*, taking a peek via *Channel into Israeli Life* by viewing a widely popular Israeli Television series, studying about *Judaism and American Law*, creating *Jewish Art*, discussing *Jews*, *Booze and Tattoos*, playing *Jewish Board Games* and learning history and traditions along the way.

Mifgash also celebrates the holidays with our teens and families. We started off the year with a delicious Sukkot luncheon spearheaded by Caryn Halle and were very inspired by a learning session about the obstacles and challenges homeless people face led by Rabbi Dan. We began the Spring semester learning about The Science of Character and the Making of a *Mensche* and are now getting ready to celebrate Purim.

Passover, or Pesach,

2019 begins at sundown on Friday, April 19, and ends Saturday evening, April 27. The first Passover seder is on the evening of April 19, and

the second Passover seder takes place on the evening of April 20.

Passover is a festival of freedom. It commemorates the Israelites' Exodus from Egypt, and their transition from slavery to freedom. The main ritual of Passover is the *seder*, which occurs on the first two night (in Israel just the first night) of the holiday - a festive meal that involves the re-telling of the Exodus through stories and song and the consumption of ritual foods, including *matzah* and *maror* (bitter herbs). The *seder*'s rituals and other readings are outlined in the Haggadah - today, many different versions of this Passover guide are available in print and online, and you can also create your own.

The central Passover practice is a set of intense dietary changes, mainly the absence of *hametz*, or foods with leavening. The ecstatic cycle of psalms called *Hallel* is recited both at night and day (during the *seder* and morning prayers). Additionally, Passover commences a 49-day period called the Omer, which recalls the count between offerings brought to the ancient Temple in Jerusalem. This count culminates in the holiday of *Shavuot*, the anniversary of the receiving of the Torah at Sinai.

We hope you will join us this year as Ohav brings an accessible seder to individuals who have developmental disabilities. This inclusive *seder* is a chance for those who might otherwise have a place to celebrate, and is a real "feel good" for everyone who gets involved. Yom HaShoah is the Day of Remembrance of the Holocaust, a day we set aside for remembering Jewish victims of the Holocaust. This year, Yom HaShoah is on Wednesday, May 1.

We always talk about remembering in conjunction with the Holocaust. Remember the six million. The world must remember so that a holocaust can never again happen. We must remember those who perished in order to honor them and give their deaths meaning.

It is memory that has allowed us to last through thousands of years of history. Our religion and our people are founded on the collective memory of revelation at Sinai. Scripture throughout commands us to remember: Remember the Sabbath day (Exodus 20:8), observe the Sabbath as a reminder of the

Creation (Exodus 20:11) and of the Exodus (Deuteronomy 5:15); remember, continually, the Exodus; remember what the evil Amalek did

All those memories in many ways define us. As the Baal Shem Tov (the founder of [Hasidism]) taught, "Forgetfulness leads to exile while remembrance is the secret of redemption."

We hope you will join us on April 28 for the Reading of the Names, so that the young children from France who were murdered and normally remain nameless will be remembered individually, if only for a few moments in time. (Please see page 7 for more information.)



Israel's Independence Day, in Hebrew Yom HaAtzmaut, is celebrated on the fifth day of the month of Iyar, which is the Hebrew date of the formal establishment of the State of Israel, when members of the "provisional government" read and

signed a Declaration of Independence in Tel Aviv. The original date was May 14, 1948. Yom HaAtzma'ut begins at sundown on Wed, 08 May 2019. Yom Ha'atzmaut in Israel is always preceded by Yom Hazikaron, Israel's Memorial Day for the fallen soldiers.



Lag B'Omer occurs on the 33rd day of the Omer, the 49-day period between Passover and Shavuot, this year on May 23.

The Omer is a time of semi-mourning, when weddings and other celebrations are forbidden. The most often cited explanation for the holiday comes from the Talmud,

which tells us that during this season a plague killed thousands of people. According to a medieval tradition, the plague ceased on *Lag B'Omer*, the 33rd day of the Omer. (The Hebrew letters *lamed* and *gimel* which make up the acronym "Lag" have the combined numerical value of 33.) As a result, *Lag B'Omer* became a happy day, interrupting the sadness of the *Omer* period for 24 hours.



Shavuot, the "Feast of Weeks," is celebrated seven weeks after Pesach, this year on June 8 - 10. Since the counting of this period (sefirat ha-omer) begins on the second evening of Passover, Shavuot takes place exactly 50 days after the (first) seder.

Shavuot combines two major religious observances. First is the grain harvest of the

early summer. Second is the giving of the Torah on Mount Sinai seven weeks after the exodus from Egypt. The first determines the ritual for the holiday, which was one of the three pilgrimage festivals of ancient Israel, when Israelite males were commanded to appear before God in Jerusalem bringing offerings of the first fruits of their harvest. The second determines the significance of the holiday for Judaism, tying it in with the seminal event of Jewish religious memory, namely the entering into a covenant between God and Israel, exemplified by Israel's assumption of Divine law. **x**

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


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
